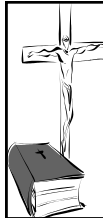

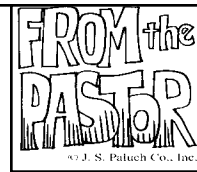

"...a time to die..."

Dear Parishioners and Visitors of Our Lady of Guadalupe,



The other day a lady said to me, “Ugh, I just wish that it would be hot or cold outside. I can’t stand that it’s cold in the morning and hot by the afternoon. You don’t know how to dress! I would rather it either be cold or hot”

Immediately, I thought of the *Book of Revelation*, 3: 14-21. You recall that God thought the very same thing!

(Not about how to dress, but about being either cold or hot). Remember, God was speaking to the Christians of a place in Laodicea and told them that He wished they were hot or cold because they were neither, but rather “lukewarm” in their faith. The point of this admonition is that God is trying to call them to repentance. He even goes so far as to say that He is so reviled by this “warm” expression of faith, that He will “vomit them out” Rev. 3:17. Wow, pretty harsh words. However, the Christians of Laodicea could relate to that analogy. You see, there were cold and hot water springs near their city. But, every once in awhile, due to climate change, the hot springs would be a little cool and the cold springs would get a little warm, hence, when the people would drink from the springs at that time, it would make them sick to their stomach. What happens when we get really sick to our stomachs? That’s right, the “v” word, we “vomit”. So, they knew exactly what He meant.

A name we have for lukewarm Catholicism is “Cultural Catholicism” or even “Cafeteria Catholicism”. That’s when we say things like, “Well, we live in America so there must be separation between church and state so I can’t impose my beliefs on others.” Or, “faith is a personal thing so I don’t think that it should be made public”. The list goes on and on. It is true that one of the foundations of our country is that there is to be no state imposed religion, however, when we interpret that to mean that we should not be public with our Catholic Christian faith, we misuse and misrepresent the true meaning of that statement. That’s what God called “lukewarm” and we know what He thinks about lukewarm Christians!

Often times I hear very faithful Catholics who regularly practice their faith tell me that they don’t want to “impose” their faith on anyone. Although I understand where they’re coming from, that position is not at all a part of our faith tradition. The Truth (capital “T” truth) is just that and just because the Truth may not be popular, it doesn’t make it any less true. It just means that it is unpopular. Inversely, what is popular isn’t always Truthful but we still must believe and defend it because it is true. God needs us to be faithful to His Truth at all times. I always tell people who sit in a church on Sundays but sit on a fence on Mondays – Saturdays, “You better hope you die on a Sunday while it’s easy to be a Christian!” We will all appear before God one day and we will be asked how we lived what we professed. We won’t be asked how we studied what we professed or how we understood what we professed or even how well we believe privately or personally what we professed but rather, how we *lived* what we professed. Does our faith translate into a way of life instead of merely a “say” in life? Be careful, because I don’t think that they put any barf bags in coffins, if you know what I mean!

By the way, I said to the lady who told me that she didn’t know how to dress for the changing climate that one outfit that never goes out of style and is always perfect for every season and temperature in life is the one we received at Baptism. It is to remain white and unstained until the everlasting life of heaven. Never be ashamed to wear it. Thanks for being with us this week and God Bless!

CIVILIZATION OF LOVE

Taking joyful comfort from the Blessed Mother’s healing of his uncle, Juan Diego scrambled up Tepeyac hill as he was bidden, and found to his amazement “a garden brimming with dew-covered flowers of the sweetest scent.” Upon cutting and bringing them to the Virgin, she arranged them in his *tilma*, saying, “My youngest son, these different kinds of flowers are the proof, the sign that you will take to the bishop. You will tell him for me that in them he is to see my wish and that therefore he is to carry out my wish, my will; and you, you who are my messenger, in you I place my absolute trust.”

With his own total trust and confidence in the words of Our Lady, Juan Diego started at once for the bishop’s home in Mexico City, all the while basking in the fragrance of the beautiful flowers he carried. When he finally arrived there, however, the doorman and the servants who had testified falsely that Juan Diego was a “sorcerer and a fraud” refused him entry, “pretending not to hear his request.” To them, Juan Diego deserved punishment, not an audience with their bishop.

Unperturbed, Juan Diego continued to wait, until the servants, at last overcome with curiosity over what he carried so gently in his *tilma*, approached him and demanded to see what he had brought. “Juan Diego, afraid (that) he could not protect the flowers from their grasping hands, opened his *tilma* just enough for the servants to see some of the flowers.” As they reached down into his mantle, “the flowers suddenly appeared as if painted or embroidered on the *tilma*’s surface.” Finally, Juan Diego was brought to see the bishop; kneeling before him, he told Zumarraga what Our Lady had said, and unfolded his *tilma*. The New Roman Missal - the New English Translation of the Latin Mass will take effect on the First Sunday of Advent, Nov. 26-27, 2011

Acclamations are more than Proclamations

“ Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again” This best known response is not included in the New Roman Missal, therefore we will no longer use. It is a strong acclamation yet it fails to express each role as the one who shares the Eucharist and awaits its fulfillment.

The new acclamations will make this function clearer.

The Lord’s Prayer remains the same (ALLELUIA!!!) – has achieved a level of holiness that cannot be replaced.

Sign of Peace: Priest: The peace of the Lord be with you always, **All: And with your spirit!**

Current Translation

Priest: **This is** the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world.

Happy are those **who are called to his supper**

All: Lord, I am not worthy **to receive you,** but only say the word and **I** shall be healed.

New Translation

Priest: **Behold** the Lamb of God **behold him** who takes away the sins of the world **Blessed** are those **called to the supper of the Lamb.**

All: Lord, I am not worthy **that you should enter under my roof** but only say the word and **my soul** shall be healed.

Happy is changed to **‘blessed’** for being blessed even experiencing sorrow. The reference to the ‘supper of the Lamb’ makes clearer allusion to Revelation 19:9.

“ Enter under my roof” - more direct connection with Matthew 8:8 and Luke 7:6, where a Gentile centurion has asked Jesus to heal our servant. Jesus intends to go to the house, but the centurion believes himself unworthy to have Jesus come to his home. Jesus admires the man’s faith and cures the servant from afar.

“I” to **“ my soul”** – we are not asking for a generic healing or even physical, we are asking for spiritual healing that alone can cure my soul.

Concluding Rites:

“ Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life.” We do not just leave the building, we enter the world with a mission.
